Definitions

Metro Milwaukee includes Milwaukee County, WI, Ozaukee County, WI, Washington County, WI and Waukesha County, WI.

Annual Average Wage: An occupation's average wage is calculated by summing the wages of all employees in the occupation and then dividing by the total number of employees in that occupation. In most cases, the annual wage is equal to the average hourly wage multiplied by 2080.

Median Wage: The median wage represents the 50th percentile of the wage distribution. Half of the employees in the occupation earn less than the median wage, half earn more.

Percent Relative Standard Error (PRSE): The Percent Relative Standard Error is the estimated standard error of the estimate divided by estimated average value of the estimate. The smaller the PRSE, the more reliable the estimate. To find the standard error, multiply the PRSE by the average value of the estimate. The standard error is used to calculate a confidence interval. A 95 percent confidence interval includes wages or employment levels two standard errors above and two standard errors below the reported average wage or employment level.
